UN panel says world should ditch dollar

A U.N. panel will next week recommend that the world ditch the dollar as its reserve currency in favor of a shared basket of currencies, a member of the panel said on Wednesday, adding to pressure on the dollar. Currency specialist Avinash Persaud, a member of the panel of experts, told a Reuters Funds Summit in Luxembourg that the proposal was to create something like the old ECU, or European currency unit, that was a hard-traded, weighted basket. *For details, [click here](#).*

The Group of 20 should be replaced by a new Global Economic Council, an advisory panel of senior international economists has said. Under the panel's proposals, the council, which would be a United Nations body, would become the main forum for setting the agenda for worldwide economic and financial policy. The proposal, made by an 18-member UN commission headed by Joseph Stiglitz, the Nobel-prizewinning economist, will be raised at next week's expanded G20 summit in London, at which heads of state will debate a global response to the world financial crisis. *For details, [click here](#).*

Transparency Report II: Have Hong Kong garment companies improved their reporting on labour standards

This report is the second attempt to rate how 26 Hong Kong garment companies are reporting on their labour standards in the supply chain. It shows that some leading companies have demonstrated progress on reporting, though there is still room for improvement and many companies still score very poorly by international standards. As part of Oxfam Hong Kong's continuous dialogue with the corporate sector, we believe that more disclosure about labour standards is one way to benefit poor people in developing countries, primarily low-paid workers. With better labour standards comes less poverty in the workforce. *For details, [click here](#).*

Moving out of poverty: Success from the bottom-up

Poverty studies typically focus on people who live below the poverty line. Few studies have examined how people are able to not only move out of but also stay out of poverty.
